#### **Equality is breaking new ground in 2024-2025!**

We are thrilled to annouce that Equality is building a **NEW** Educational Complex to house our new Elementary School and our High School. This new building will be a unified space for scholars, grades K-5 and 9-12, and their families to experience and participate in a true community complex.

When complete, this new Elementary and High School building will have over 62,000 square feet of interior space plus over 7,000 square feet of outdoor space.

Both the Elementary School and High School will have their own, distinct facilities within the building, including separate entrances.

The building will have 2 large indoor spaces: a **3,784 square** foot cafeteria and a 5,002 square foot gym with a full sized basketball court. The facility will include a 7,000 square foot rooftop recreation area, an art room, a library, a media lab, and a High School science lab.

We look forward to this journey together, with our newest scholars starting in Elementary School and then graduating from the same building at the end of their High School career with us.

## a positive outcome

#### Our Internship Program has been re-launched!

Our Junior scholars' Internship Program has been re-launched in person for the 2022-23 school year. And we've expanded by offering this same program to our Senior scholars, some of whom are already pursuing their career goals in Health Care at Jacobi Hospital. Equality Charter School's Internship Program allows scholars to explore their career interests and talents by participating in work-based experiences.



Through these experiences, scholars learn positive work behaviors, develop resumes, network at events, strengthen college applications, and learn to become leaders in the community. Industries include Science and Technology, Health and Medicine, Media Communications, Arts and Education, and Government and Public Administration.

Generally speaking, internship programs provide the missing ingredient that employers are seeking in job candidates. Relevant work experience can be just as important as academic performance when it comes to finding the right job. This is why Equality's internship program is so important in helping our scholars get more out of life post High School.

Equality believes in meeting our scholars where they are and working with them to develop the tools they will need to excel, wherever their life's journey may take them. We believe that being self-aware, being

able to manage their own independence, and honing their critical thinking skills are tools that will serve our scholars best in their wild and precious journey through life.

Many public charter schools position their vision as "college for all." Typically this means the sole emphasis from an early age of schooling is that the only acceptable postgraduation outcome is to

attend some level of college. This approach does not work for us, and we see our responsibility differently.

For many scholars and their families, college may not be their first choice, and may never





be their choice. In fact, today's economy and workforce accommodates many skill sets that may never require college. We want those decisions to be up to our scholars and their families - not ECS. Instead, we will use our time with ECS scholars to make certain we have helped them prove readiness while they are with us.

Our internship program is an integral part of giving our scholars the well rounded, experience based foundation they need to build greater and greater successes as adults.

## narrowing the divide

### **Equality's journey to increase Racial Equity** continues in 2022-2023 with these four steps:

- 1. Increasing the Racial Equity Committee's capacity to lead Racial Equity Work:
  - a. Educate The Facilitator Program Offered by our Racial Equity Consultant,
     Jamilah Pitts
  - b. Reading articles, and listening to podcasts to lead the school community in having thoughtful and informed discussions about Racial Equity
  - c. Collecting and sharing edifying resources as a Racial Equity Committee
  - d. Empowering staff at all levels to become Racial Equity thought leaders

- 2. Bringing our Racial Equity work to our scholars through:
- a. Culturally Responsive SustainingPedagogy November PD
- **b.** Developing Socratic Seminars to:
- i. Encourage introspection
- ii. Examine how we think about and interact with our scholars and colleagues
- 3. Making sure that Racial Equity work is prioritized and differentiated as often as possible: Providing PD to both instructional and non-instructional staff.







Equality recognizes that racism exists within all facets of our society. Our work requires active and intentional questioning and interventions of policies, behaviors, & processes to combat racism.

4. Hiring staff members that reflect our scholars as well as the world around them. Progress Thus Far:

During our organization-wide November Professional Development, each of our departments engaged in differentiated sessions:

- a. The 7 Tenets of Liberatory Teaching (supported by Jamilah Pitts)
- **b.** Supporting women of color in the workplace (Racial Equity Committee)
- c. Liberatory Practices in non-instructional areas (supported by Teaching Matters)

In an effort to build our capacities as leaders, our Racial Equity Committee has led two Socratic Seminars and plans to lead 3 more later this school year. Each of these discussions aims to bring awareness to issues of race that concern our scholars or the larger school community.

Our HR department is working with Chambers
North Star Consulting to increase the
representation of staff members in the BILPOC
(Black, Indigenous, Latinx, People of Color)
communities. We are happy to report > 15%
increase in the number of staff members whose
demographics reflect our scholar population!



The numbers below show the "functional expense analysis" of our 2022 / 2023 budget.






